The European Transport Safety Council (ETSC), together with the Czech Transport Research Centre (CDV), have the pleasure to invite you to the latest “Safe & Sober” Seminar. The “Safe & Sober” campaign was started by ETSC in 2007 and it aims to raise awareness amongst policy makers, the private sector as well as key opinion leaders, towards a systemic approach to reduce alcohol misuse in road transport.

In the framework of this campaign, supported by the Volvo Group and ACS, ETSC is organising a series of roundtable events (the “Safe & Sober Talks”) in selected European countries bringing together “drink driving stakeholders”, road safety experts and companies. Measures to tackle drink driving, such as the use of alcohol interlocks, enforcement, the BAC limit and targeting novice drivers, are on the agenda of the event in Prague.

More and more countries in Europe are adopting legislation for the use of alcohol interlocks in rehabilitation programmes as a substitute punishment of driving license withdrawal. But, in many EU countries, the technology has found its way into vehicles which are used for the transport of goods or passengers on a voluntary basis. The alcohol interlock is used as a quality assurance tool to comply with a company’s alcohol and drugs policy. With the alcohol interlock, a company can guarantee that they only use sober drivers for their transport services. Many companies have already installed alcohol interlocks in their vehicles as an excellent guarantee of safe and sober transport services. More and more municipalities, county councils, public agencies and companies that source passenger and goods transport services are making alcohol interlocks a requirement in negotiating contracts.

Due to the early introduction of a Zero BAC limit for all drivers, today drink driving is socially unacceptable in the Czech Republic and the population is well aware of the limit in their country. However, in 2011, there were 5,242 (7.5%) crashes involving alcohol with 89 deaths (12.6%) and 2,701 people injured.
