Lithuania Receives PIN Road Safety Award 2011

Road Deaths Cut by 58% in Lithuania since 2001

21 June 2011, Brussels – “It is my pleasure to give this year’s PIN Award⁽¹⁾ to Lithuania and Sweden. All the countries that received the PIN Award have lived up to our expectations, and I am positive that all EU member states will have a lot to learn from these two,” said Antonio Avenoso, ETSC⁽²⁾ Executive Director at the PIN Award Ceremony held during the 5th Annual Conference⁽³⁾ of the Road Safety Performance Index (PIN) Programme⁽⁴⁾. The Award for Lithuania was received by Eligijus Masiulis, Minister for Transport.

Lithuania achieved an outstanding 58% reduction in road deaths between 2001 and 2010, the third best reduction in the EU.⁽⁵⁾ Mr. Masiulis praised the cooperation between the responsible institutions in his country, as well as the cooperation of the Lithuanian public. The results of a recent survey in Lithuania show the public -as reluctant to change their behaviour- also wanting the government to be strict on road safety. Mr. Masiulis mentioned as reasons for success the lowering of the legal blood alcohol limit to 0.4g/l and 0.2 for novice and professional drivers and increased fines for speeding – just two of the Lithuanian policy changes – and the improvements made in the road infrastructure.

While the reduction in the number of deaths on Lithuanian roads is laudable, road mortality remains high, with 90 deaths per million inhabitants in 2010.⁽⁶⁾ Mr. Masiulis acknowledged this challenge. “Our main ambition is no more than 200 road deaths in 2017, which means no more than 60 deaths per million inhabitants. Achieving these targets would get us into the list of the top 10 safest countries in the EU27. We have also adopted Vision Zero. We want Lithuania to be a safe and friendly country for its citizens and guests.”

Mr. Masiulis acknowledged the positive effects of the EU membership. “The absorption of EU funds can really help us improve our infrastructure. We have to build more bypass roads and start making use of ITS technologies,” he said. Lithuania transposed the 2008 EU Directive on infrastructure safety and road safety auditors are being trained to ensure the implementation of this key piece of EU legislation. “This will help us to reduce further the number of high risk sites on our roads”.⁽⁷⁾

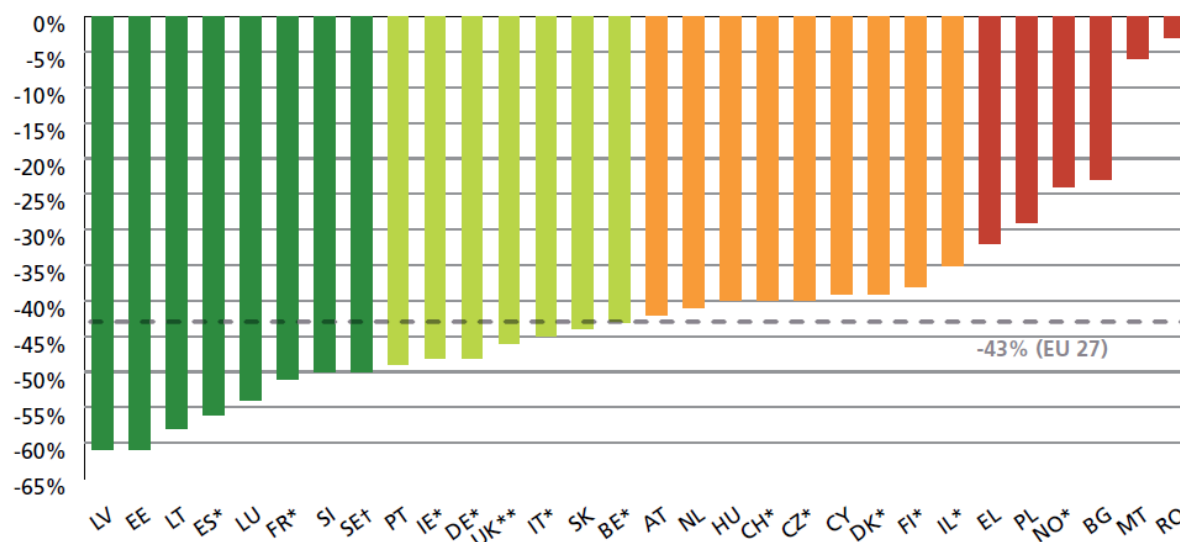

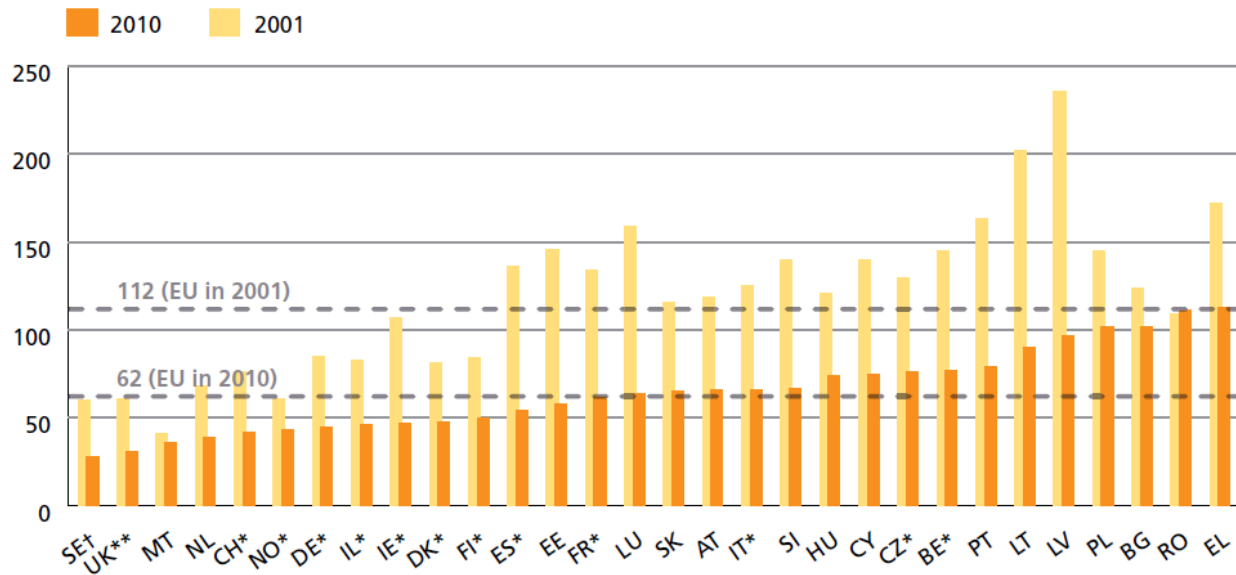
