## Sweden Receives Road Safety PIN Award 2011

Road Deaths Cut by 50% in Sweden since 2001

**21 June 2011, Brussels** – “It is my pleasure to give this year’s PIN Award<sup>(1)</sup> to Sweden and Lithuania. Since 2006, all the countries that received the PIN Award have lived up to our expectations, and I am positive that all EU member states will have a lot to learn from these two,” said Antonio Avenoso, ETSC<sup>(2)</sup> Executive Director at the PIN Award Ceremony held during the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference<sup>(3)</sup> of the Road Safety Performance Index (PIN) Programme<sup>(4)</sup>. The Award for Sweden was received by Catharina Elmsäter-Svärd, Minister for Infrastructure.

“Sweden embodies the reason why we think that ambitious targets should be set,” Mr. Avenoso said. “Sweden has the lowest traffic mortality in Europe, and this was also the case in 2001. We see the perfect example that road deaths can be cut in any country, regardless of the starting point,” Mr. Avenoso explained.<sup>(5)(6)</sup>

Ms. Elmsäter-Svärd reaffirmed the support of all stakeholders in Sweden for the Vision Zero<sup>(7)</sup> adopted in 1997 as the long term road safety goal by all stakeholders in her country. “The strength of Vision Zero is that it gives a common goal for all stakeholders to strive for and to contribute to, even if different groups prefer different ways to get there.” Ms. Elmsäter-Svärd said.

She also welcomed benchmarking between countries, adding that there is room for improvement in all countries, and it is a constant challenge to observe and adapt what the others are doing. “The ETSC PIN Project and receiving the PIN Award have given us new energy in Sweden,” Ms. Elmsäter-Svärd added.

“We have to keep up the good work to involve all relevant stakeholders to take their responsibility.<sup>(8)</sup> One example is that the employers should take much more responsibility for their employees’ way of driving and the vehicles used. I think this is particularly the case with regards to speeding and driving under the influence of alcohol, drugs or tiredness,” Ms. Elmsäter-Svärd said. She also highlighted the importance of research, announcing that Sweden is currently establishing a Vision Zero Academy which would focus on policy implementation processes and innovation for road safety.<sup>(9)</sup>

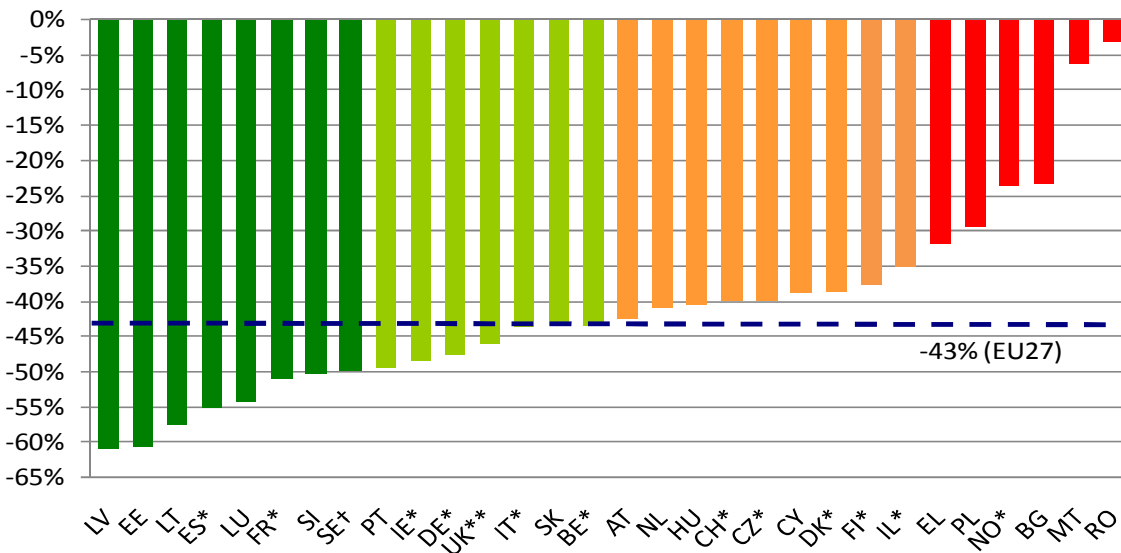

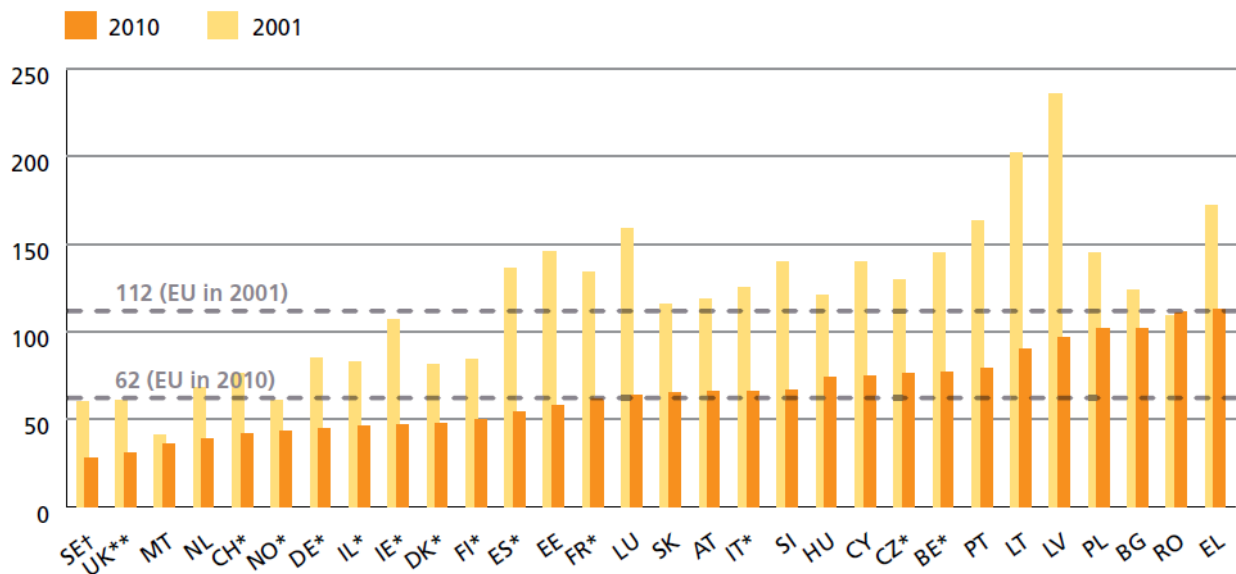
