The European Transport Safety Council (ETSC) is an international non-governmental organisation which was formed in 1993 in response to the persistent and unacceptably high European road casualty toll and public concern about individual transport tragedies. It brings together experts of international reputation and representatives of 45 national and international organisations concerned with transport safety from across Europe to exchange experience and knowledge and to identify and promote research-based contributions to transport safety. ETSC provides an impartial source of advice on transport safety matters to the European Commission, the European Parliament and to national governments and organisations concerned with safety throughout Europe.

ETSC set up in 2006 the Road Safety Performance Index (PIN) as an instrument to spur European countries to greater efforts to enhance road safety. By comparing Member States' performance, it serves to identify and promote best practice in Europe and bring about the kind of political leadership that is needed to create what citizens deserve – a road transport system that offers all practicable safety. www.etsc.eu/PIN

The index currently includes the 27 EU Member States, as well as Israel, Norway, Serbia and Switzerland. The PIN Programme relies on the Panellists in the participating countries to provide the data for their countries and to confirm the quality of the data. This forms the basis for all PIN publications, which are circulated in draft to the PIN Steering Group and Panel for comment and are finalised after taking account of comments received from them.

In June each year at the PIN Conference ETSC publicises the results of the Annual Report and awards the PIN Award to a high level policymaker responsible for the country's outstanding progress in road safety.

To further disseminate the findings of the PIN in the countries participating ETSC organises with its Members and the PIN Panellist a series of national events the PIN Talks. National decision-makers are confronted with both the successes and shortcomings of their road safety policy.
