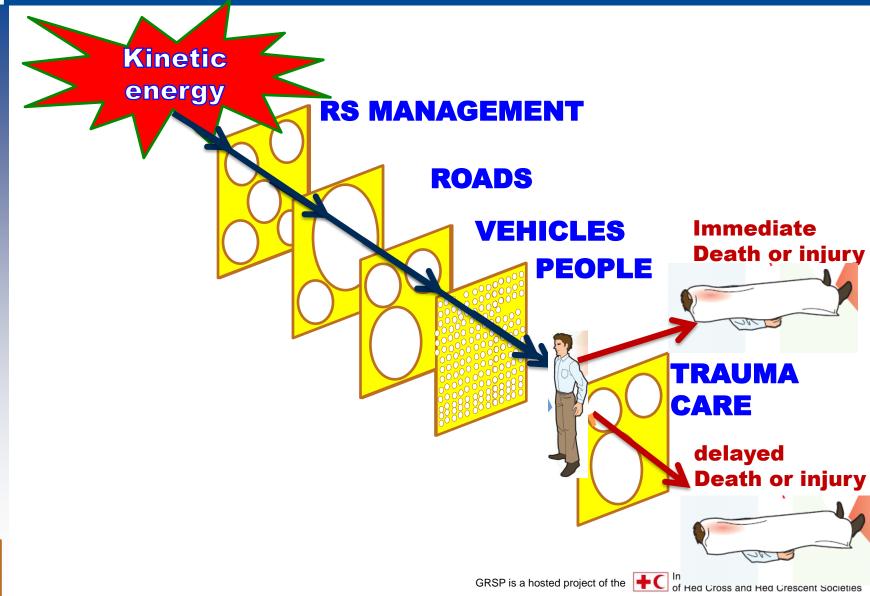

- 2 May Cyclone Nargis, Myanmar, over 100,000 dead and 2 million homeless
- 12 May Sichuan earthquake, 55,000 dead, 25,000 missing, 5 million displaced

- Focus on key risk factors, capacity building, an aligned plan
- Increased funding requested
- Red Cross and Red Crescent National Societies committed

Drink drive crashes reduction of 22% after demonstration project in Olzstyn, Poland

3% to 80%: helps a 20% reduction in death and injury on Sakhalin, Russia

Drink drive case reduction of over 65% after demonstration projects in two Chinese cities



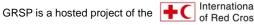
Killed and Serious Injury reduced by 62% in São José dos Campos, Brazil

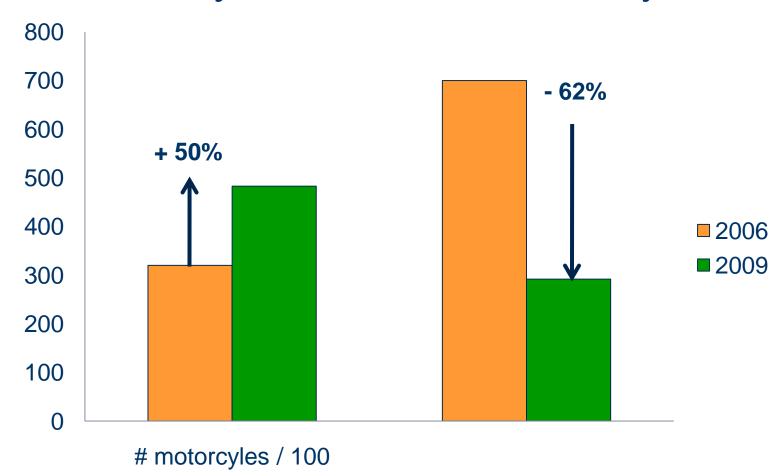

Seat Belts, Sakhalin





- Seat Belts identified as key risk in 2004
- •International *Good Practice* workshop held 2005
- Many parters from all sections of society joined campaigns
- •Three campaigns made in 2005, 2006, 2007 using *Good Practice* toolkit
- •Key change in law in 2007, seat belt fine raised by federal government
- •Seat belt wearing now up to 80%, death and injury down 20% in 2008

Safe Routes to School, Sakhalin







- GIBDD saw upward trend in child injuries in 2005
- Sakhalin Road Safety Partnership held Good Practice workshop with international expertise
- Several partners joined project (Education, GIBDD, Businesses, Parents, Teachers)
- 2 pilot schools selected
- Materials produced (maps, posters, videos, school curriculum material)
- Low cost infrastructure improvements made around the schools with support from international expertise, city council and businesses.
- Evaluation of project ongoing very well received by parents and community
- Expansion of project under way



Police Professional Development





Some speed initiatives

- Urban speed control in city programmes
- 120 Speed guns from Australia to police in various parts of the world
- Six major junctions in Beijing adapted with low cost measures to reduce vehicle /VRU conflicts
- Starting a speed control project on a Chinese highway



Road Safety in Ten Countries

- Funded by Bloomberg Philanthropies
- Five year, US\$ 125 million collaborative investment to focus on implementing good practice
- Six partner organisations: GRSP, WHO, John Hopkins University, EMBARQ, ASIRT, World Bank
- GRSP role in consortium is to deliver capacity building in support of good practice interventions
- Brazil, Mexico, Russia, Turkey, Egypt, Kenya, India, Cambodia, Vietnam, China



The Global Road Safety Initiative













- Five year, US\$ 10 million collaborative investment to focus on implementing good practice
- Largest co-ordinated private sector investment so far
- Now going into second phase for 2011 2014
- There is still the possibility to join up and make it larger!



EU "Save our Lives" project

- Funded by European Union and 12 partners in the Central European Space
- 3 year, EUR 3.5 million project to improve road safety across cities in 7 European countries
- GRSP is the technical advisor to the project
- GRSP partner organisations in Hungary and Poland have major role in implementation
- Poland, Hungary, Czech Republic, Austria, Slovakia, Italy, Germany



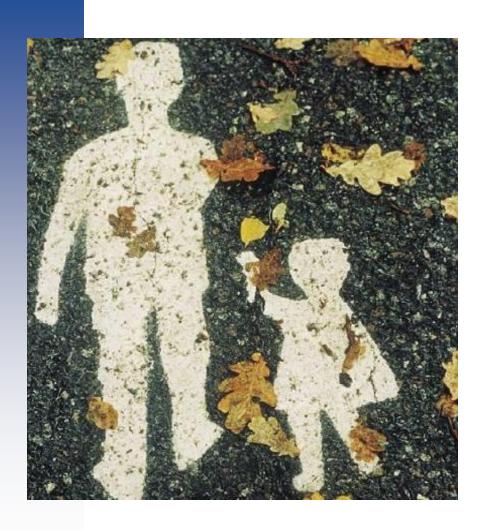
ISO-39001 – Road Safety Quality Management



- A single global framework for organisations to improve the quality of road safety in their products and services
- The <u>requirements</u> needed to reach a zero death and injury target
 - Management commitment to zero goal
 - The risks that must be addressed
- A structured ISO management system to assist continuous improvement



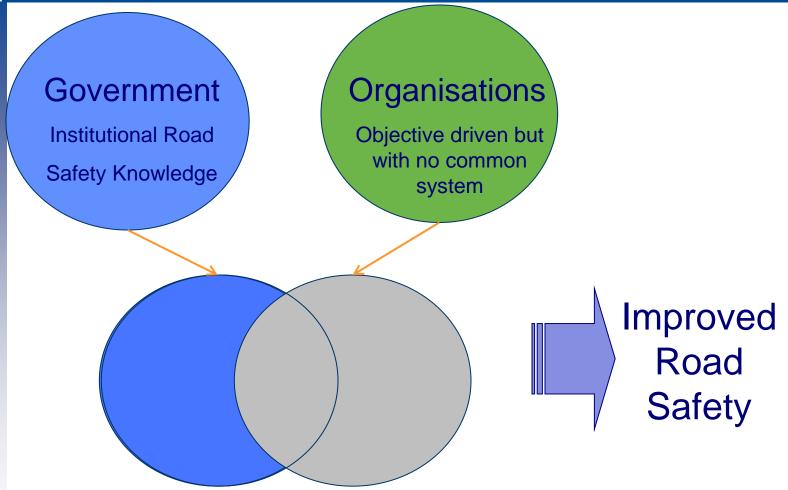
The vision behind ISO 39001



- A global standard for addressing organisational road transport risks in a systematic way
- Elimination of death and serious injury in the road transport system
- A voluntary and complementary tool to legislation, adressing all organizations
- Knowledge transfer between traffic safety experts and the user community of the standard.



ISO-39001- Creating Common Language





Driving ISO-39001 Implementation

- Companies that are good citizens
- Commercial sense cost and risk reduction
- Commercial pressure large companies will require contractors to comply
- Governmental pressure for public fleet compliance
- NB: use of ISO14001 Environmental Standard went to 130,000 organisations in ten years

I COMMIT TO:

- Use a seatbelt
- Wear a helmet on a motorcycle
- Drive at a safe speed and distance suitable for the conditions
- → Not drive under the influence of alcohol or drugs
- Not use a mobile phone when driving
- Be visible as a pedestrian or cyclist
- Know and respect the highway code
- Maintain my vehicle in a good condition
- Be licensed and trained for the vehicle I drive
- Know how to react in case of a crash
