



## Safe and Sober Transport Alcohol Interlock Seminar 15<sup>th</sup> March 2012

In 2007 ETSC started a campaign on drink driving, called "Safe & Sober". In light of the European Union's road safety target to halve road deaths by 2020, the objective of this activity is to raise awareness amongst policy makers, the private sector as well as key opinion leaders for a systemic approach to reduce alcohol misuse in road transport.

In the framework of this campaign, supported by the Volvo Group and ACS, ETSC is organising a series of roundtable events (the "Safe & Sober Talks") in selected European countries bringing together "drink driving stakeholders", road safety experts and companies. On the agenda will be measures to tackle drink driving such as the use of alcohol interlocks, enforcement, the BAC limit and targeting novice drivers.

More and more countries in Europe are adopting legislation for the use of alcohol interlocks in rehabilitation programmes as a substitute punishment of driving license withdrawal. But, in many EU countries, the technology has found its way into vehicles which are used for the transport of goods or passengers on a voluntary basis. The alcohol interlock is used as a quality assurance tool to comply with a company's alcohol and drugs policy. With the alcoholock, a company can guarantee that they only use sober drivers for their transport services. Many companies have already had alcohol interlocks in their vehicles as an excellent guarantee of safe and sober transport services. More and more municipalities, county councils, public agencies and companies that source passenger and goods transport services are making alcohol interlocks a requirement in negotiating contracts.

Finland is probably the country with the most advanced legislation regarding the implementation of alcohol interlocks. Indeed, besides a developed offender programme, since 1st August 2011 alcohol interlocks have been mandatory in all vehicles used in chartered school and daycare transportation. Not only the Finnish law includes details about the installation of an alcohol interlock and its appropriate use but also covers the maintenance issue and violation related offences. Additionally, Finland is also studying the possibility of making mandatory the use of alcohol interlocks in all transport services paid by public funds in the years to come.
